# DLP5532PROJHBQ1EVM Evaluation Module



### **ABSTRACT**

The DLP5532PROJHBQ1EVM Evaluation Module (EVM) is an automotive projector designed to support high brightness transparent window display applications such as advertisement and vehicle-to-vehicle and vehicle-to-pedestrian communication. The DLP5532PROJQ1EVM supports proof of concept demos and speeds up the development cycle by providing a high performance projector solution complete with optics, LED light sources, and adjustable throw distance. This EVM includes a complete electronic subsystem designed to control the DLP5532-Q1 chipset. The DLP5532-Q1 chipset consists of the DLP5532-Q1, the DLPC230-Q1, and the TPS99000-Q1. This projector enables high brightness displays with a luminous flux output of 600 lumens and contrast of 600:1 in a compact package. With additional development of the LED driver board - including higher LED current support per channel and a robust thermal design - this projection engine can provide upwards of 1,000 lumens. The projection lens is designed for a throw ratio of 1.8, 100% offset, and an adjustable focus distance from 450 mm to 1000 mm.

The DLP5532PROJHBQ1EVM is not a production design. It is intended for evaluation only.

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#### 1 User Guide Overview

This user's guide presents an overview and general description of the DLP5532PROJHBQ1EVM and provides first steps for getting started using the EVM.

### 1.1 What is in the DLP5532PROJHBQ1EVM

The DLP5532PROJHBQ1EVM consists of a controller PCB, an illumination driver PCB, cables, and a USB to SPI adapter. The DLP5532PROJHBQ1EVM also includes an optical module designed to combine with the electronic subsystem for evaluation of a fully functioning projector in an automotive setting.

#### 1.1.1 Controller PCB




Figure 1-1. DLP5532PROJHBQ1EVM Controller PCB

The controller PCB shown in Figure 1-1 includes the DLP5532-Q1 DMD, the DLPC230-Q1 DMD Controller, and the TPS99000-Q1. The controller PCB supports video inputs from either a micro HDMI or OpenLDI interface and provides the formatting and control to display the video on the DLP5532-Q1 DMD. The EVM can be controlled with either a SPI or an I<sup>2</sup>C interface. The SPI or I<sup>2</sup>C interface can also be used to reprogram the serial Flash that is used to store DLPC230-Q1 software and configuration. An optional second SPI port is provided for monitoring the TPS99000-Q1. The EVM has an external photodiode input that is used to control white point and brightness over the dimming range. An optional second photodiode input is also provided. The EVM includes a flex interface to control and monitor the illumination driver PCB. It also provides an optional interface for thermistors on the red, green and blue illuminator PCBs that can be used to monitor the temperatures of the illuminators.

The controller PCB switches are listed in Table 1-3. SW4 is a toggle switch for PROJ\_ON which is used to turn on and off the electronics. Note that parts of the board are still powered when PROJ\_ON is in the off position. SW1, SW2 and SW3 are dip switches that control the states of configuration signals the DLPC230-Q1 reads when it comes out of reset. These switches must be set based on the desired configuration options.

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#### 1.1.2 Illumination Driver PCB

The illumination driver PCB shown in Figure 1-2 is controlled and monitored by the controller PCB over a flex cable. Power can be input to the illumination driver from a bench top supply. The illumination driver provides reverse bias protection and supplies power to the controller PCB over a separate cable. The illumination driver PCB regulates the input power to 17 V prior to the illumination driver circuitry. The illumination driver has outputs for red, green and blue illuminators. These are typically LEDs, but it is possible other illuminators can be used. Together with the controller PCB, the illuminators are meant to be sequentially pulsed and synchronized with the operation of the DMD micromirrors. See *Electrical Specifications* for input and output specifications of the EVM. Depending on operating conditions, some parts and surfaces of the PCB can be hot.

The illumination driver PCB contains the ports listed in Table 1-4. Note that all ports with the schematic reference J20# are located on the bottom of the illumination driver PCB board.

The illumination driver PCB contains the headers listed in Table 1-5. These headers provide a protective feedback loop between the active cooling fans and the power regulator. In the event that one of the fans is not working or does not receive adequate input power, the feedback loop disables the power regulator and protects the illumination driver circuitry. The headers can be removed to disable the fan feedback loops if fans are not going to be used.




Figure 1-4. EVM Cables

- (1) Conditions for maximum power: white balanced LED current up to 10 A, LED forward voltage = 12.3 V, display duty cycle = 90/10.
- (2) Care must be taken to ensure that individual components and PCB do not exceed their maximum temperature when driving high-power load.
- (3) Some components are only rated to 85°C. Refer to Table 1-8 for a list of these components.

### 1.2.2 Component Temperature Ratings

The PCB materials and most of the PCB components are rated to operate between –40°C to 105°C, including the DLP5530-Q1, the DLPC230-Q1, and the TPS99000-Q1.

Some components on board, such as switches, connectors, and indicator LEDs, do not meet this temperature rating. The specifications for EVM components which are not rated between –40°C to 105°C are listed in Table 1-8. Please refer to the EVM bill of materials to review the temperature specifications of all components used in the EVM design.

The controller and illumination driver PCBs have a UL flame rating of 130°C maximum.

This is not a production design. It is intended for evaluation only.

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# 1.2.3 Input Video Specifications

The following input video resolutions are supported on the HDMI and OpenLDI interfaces. These input video resolutions are programmed in the Extended Display Identification Data (EDID) EEPROM for the EVM's HDMI interface allowing a connected computer to read the supported resolutions and timing. Note that some computers are not able to output all of these resolutions, in particular 576 × 288.

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
## 2 Quick Start

Use the following instructions to setup the DLP5532PROJHBQ1EVM and PC for video input and control communication.

## 2.1 Kit Assembly Instructions

A diagram of all connections is shown in Figure 2-1.

- Connect the host SPI/I2C cable to the controller PCB (J2/J1) and the FTDI adapter. Connect the FTDI adapter's USB cable to PC.
- Connect the Micro HDMI cable to the controller PCB (J3). Connect the Micro HDMI cable to PC HDMI port. 2.
- Connect the power input cable to the illumination driver PCB (J3).



Reference letters refer to cables listed in Table 1-6.

Figure 2-1. EVM Cable Connections

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


Figure 2-2. FTDI to SPI Cable Connection

For correct orientation of the numbering of leads notice that on the SPI cable there is a notch at the top. Note that there is some unused cables from the FTDI cable and unconnected pins on the SPI cable.

- 1. Connect brown wire of FTDI cable (Chip Select) to pin 9 of SPI cable.
- 2. Connect orange wire of FTDI cable (Clock) to pin 7 of SPI cable.
- 3. Connect green wire of FTDI cable (Serial In) to pin 5 of SPI cable.
- 4. Connect black wire of FTDI cable (Ground) to pin 2 of SPI cable.
- 5. Connect yellow wire of FTDI cable (Serial Out) to pin 8 of SPI cable.




Figure 2-3. FTDI to I2C Connection

It is also possible to communicate with the EVM through I2C. Note that there is some unused cables from the FTDI cable and unused cables from the I2C cable.

- 1. Connect orange wire of FTDI cable (Clock) to orange wire of I2C cable.
- 2. Connect yellow wire of FTDI cable (Serial Out) to yellow wire of I2C cable.
- 3. Connect black wire of FTDI cable (Ground) to black wire of I2C cable.
- 4. Connect green wire of FTDI cable (Serial In) to green wire of I2C cable.

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



Figure 2-4. Fan Connection Cables

The following provide visual references for the LED cable connections involving the DLP5532PROJHBQ1EVM projector itself.



#### Note

The cables are already connected and assembled by the manufacturer. Please only disassemble if required. There is a back plate held together by four screws. The LED cables have no locking tabs and can be pulled out with force. To re-insert the LED cables, a tool like a screwdriver can be needed to push down on the connector to ensure a secure connection.

### **WARNING**

Please do not attempt to remove the four screws on the LED heat sinks as this impacts the alignment of the illumination system.

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#### 2.2 Software Installation

- 1. Download and install the DLPC230-Q1 Control Program Lite from Tl.com.
- Install Total Phase Cheetah USB Adapter Drivers from the Total Phase website.

### 2.3 Powering-Up EVM

- Connect input power cable to a power supply that meets input power specifications defined in Table 1-7. The
  red wire is the V+ terminal and black wire is the V- terminal.
- 2. Turn on the supply power. After powered up, a controller PCB LED indicator (D4) illuminates green.
- 3. Turn the PROJ\_ON switch (SW4) ON. The ON position is away from the board, and OFF is toward the board. A controller PCB LED indicator (D5) illuminates green.

### 2.4 Connecting EVM to the DLPC230-Q1 Control Program

- 1. Start the DLPC230-Q1 Control Program Lite.




Figure 2-6. Connecting to the DLPC230-Q1 Using the DLPC230-Q1 Automotive Control Program

- 2. On the connection page, set the DLPC230-Q1 Host to SPI and select the Cheetah from the drop-down menu (see Figure 2-6). Note, the Cheetah must be connected to a computer with USB cable for it to show up in the drop-down menu.




Figure 2-7. DLPC230-Q1 Automotive Control Program Communication Settings

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3. Select *Connection Settings* to confirm the SPI configuration shown in Figure 2-7 matches the controller PCB switch settings described in Table 1-3. Specifically, SPI mode and CRC/Checksum can vary based on switch

settings. When configuration is complete, press OK.

4. Click the *Connect* button. The green circle next to the Connect button then lights up to indicate that connection was successful to the Cheetah Adapter.

### 2.5 Steps to Reprogram the Onboard Flash Memory

The DLP5532PROJHBQ1EVM comes with onboard serial Flash that is pre-programmed with software and basic configuration. The software and configuration can be updated by reprogramming the serial Flash with the DLPC230-Q1 Automotive Control Program. Steps to re-program the serial Flash are listed below.

- 1. Using the DLPC230-Q1 Automotive Control Program, that is connected to the EVM, navigate to the *Flash Program* tab.
- 2. Navigate to the *Read Flash* sub tab and select *entire flash* content to be saved to a local storage location. (Note that this step is optional but highly recommended to save the current flash content as a backup.
- Navigate back to the Program Flash sub tab and using the folder icon, select an Image File (.bin) and open it.
- 4. Click Program and Verify Flash Memory.

Note that if the device is in Display mode, it is automatically be switched to Standby during programming.



# 3 Optical Engine Requirements and Specifications

The DLP5532PROJHBQ1EVM includes an optical projection system that can be used for transparent window display applications. The optical specifications are listed in Table 3-1.
