DAC80516 Evaluation Module



Description

The DAC80516EVM is an easy-to-use platform to evaluate the functionality and performance of the DAC80516 device. The DAC80516EVM has optional circuits and jumpers to configure the device for different applications. The DAC80516 is installed on the EVM.

The DAC80516 offers 16 low power, 16-bit, buffered voltage-output DACs with a full-scale output of 2.5V or 5V. The devices include a 2.5V internal reference. The DAC output range is programmable to 2.5V or 5V.



1 Evaluation Module Overview

1.1 Introduction

This user's guide describes the characteristics, operation, and recommended use cases of the DAC80516EVM. This document provides examples and instructions on how to use the DAC80516EVM board and included software. Throughout this document, the terms evaluation board, evaluation module, and EVM are synonymous with the DAC80516EVM. This document also includes a schematic, reference printed circuit board (PCB) layouts, and a complete bill of materials (BOM).

1.3 Specification

The EVM is intended to provide basic functional evaluation of the device. The layout is not intended to be a model for the target circuit, nor laid out for electromagnetic compatibility (EMC) testing. The EVM consists of a printed-circuit board (PCB), which has the DAC80516 installed.

1.4 Device Information

The 16-bit DAC80516 and 12-bit DAC60516 are a pin-compatible family of low power, 16-channel, buffered voltage-output, digital-to-analog converters (DACs). The DAC80516 includes a 2.5V internal reference, eliminating the need for an external precision reference in most applications. A user-selectable gain configuration provides full-scale output voltages of 2.5V (gain = 1), or 5V (gain = 2). The device operates from a single 2.7V to 5.5V supply.

Communication to the DAC80516 is performed through a serial interface that supports SPI and I²C communication (using a shared interface with auto-detect) and operates at clock rates of up to 50MHz for SPI, and 1Mhz for I2C (Fast Mode Plus). The VIO pin enables serial interface operation from 1.65V to 5.5V. The DAC80516 flexible interface enables operation with a wide range of industry-standard microprocessors and microcontrollers.

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2 Hardware

2.1 Hardware Setup

This section describes the overall system setup for the EVM. A computer runs software that communicates with the on-board FT4232 controller using SPI or I²C protocols.

2.1.1 Hardware Theory of Operation




Figure 2-1. DAC80516EVM Theory of Operation Block Diagram

The DAC80516EVM is connected to the computer through the on-board FT4232 digital controller using the USB cable that is supplied with the EVM. The evaluation board features connectors and test points for all communication lines, DAC outputs, digital pins, and supplies. Figure 2-1 shows a block diagram of the DAC80516EVM.

The USB connection provides the 5V supply to the EVM. Voltage regulators generate 3.3V and 1.8V from the USB 5V supply. These 3.3V and 1.8V supplies are used to power the FT4232 controller.

The DAC80516 AVDD supply can use the on-board 5V or 3.3V supplies depending on the jumper J6 setting. By default, AVDD is connected to the on-board 5V supply. Alternatively, AVDD can be supplied externally through banana jack J4. Remove the jumper connector on J6 before connecting external supplies to AVDD.

The DAC80516 VIO supply can use the on-board 1.8V or use the same voltage as AVDD depending on the jumper J5 setting. By default, VIO is connected to AVDD. Alternatively, VIO can be supplied externally through banana jack J8. Remove the jumper connector on J5 before connecting external supplies to VIO.

The device reference voltage can be supplied via an on-board 2.5V voltage regulator by shorting jumper J12, or from an external supply with SMA J10. Make sure that the DAC80516 internal reference is powered off before connecting any other voltage supply to the REF pin.

Each of the DAC outputs have optional capacitative and resistive loads that are not populated by default. In addition, C36 is a dedicated capacitor footprint that is isolated from the ground and power planes of the EVM. This capacitor can be used for precise glitch measurements.

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2.1.2 Jumper Definitions

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


Figure 2-2. DAC80516EVM Default Jumper Settings

The jumpers must be connected properly to operate the DAC80516EVM. Table 2-1 provides the details of the configurable jumper settings of the DAC80516EVM. Figure 2-2 shows the default jumper connections on the board.

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2.2 Hardware Overview

This section details how to configure the EVM for voltage outputs using I²C and SPI. The following subsections provide detailed information on the EVM hardware and jumper positions for the two communication modes (see also Section 2.1.2).

2.2.1 Connecting the FT4232 Digital Controller

To connect the FT4232 digital controller on the EVM board to the computer, align and firmly connect the USB connector to the J3 connector. Verify the connection is snug; a loose connection can cause intermittent operation. A 100 mil header (J15) is available for external communication. Table 2-6 lists the J15 pin definitions. To use external communication, close jumper J1 to disable the connection to the FT4232 controller. When using external I²C, TI recommends to close the J16 and J17 jumpers in the I²C positions, as the jumpers connect the pull-up resistors R43 and R44 to the communication lines.




Figure 2-3. DAC80516EVM SPI Configuration




Figure 2-4. DAC80516EVM I²C Configuration

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2.2.4 Glitch Testing




Figure 2-5. Glitch Testing

The DAC80516EVM has dedicated test points for measuring glitch on the OUT15 pin. Test point TP12 and capacitor C36 are isolated from the ground and power plane on the EVM. To best measure glitch, remove R31 to isolate the OUT15 pin from the rest of the EVM circuitry and populate C36 with the desired capacitive load. A probe can be placed across TP12 and TP13. Figure 2-5 shows a glitch measurement taken with the DAC80516EVM. In this example, C36 was populated with a 10pF capacitor and the glitch was captured on the rising edge between codes 0x7FFF to 0x8000.

3 Software

3.1 Software Setup

This section provides the procedure for EVM software installation.

3.1.1 Software Installation

Download the latest version of the EVM graphical user interface (GUI) installer from the *Order and start development* subsection of the DAC80516EVM tool folder on TI.com. Run the GUI installer to install the DAC805xxEVM GUI software on your computer. The software installation automatically copies the required LabVIEW[™] software files and drivers to the computer.




Figure 3-1. Software Installation Path

When the DAC805xxEVM GUI is launched, an installation dialog window opens and prompts the user to select an installation directory. If left unchanged, Figure 3-1 shows that the software location defaults to C:\Program Files (x86)\Texas Instruments\DAC805xxEVM.




Figure 3-2. FTDI USB Drivers

The EVM software also installs the Future Technology Devices International Limited (FTDI) USB drivers using a separate executable file. Figure 3-2 shows the FTDI USB drivers installation window that is automatically launched after the DAC805xxEVM software installation is complete.

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3.2 Software Overview

This section discusses how to use the DAC8050xxEVM software.

3.2.1 Launching the Software

Launch the DAC8050xxEVM software by searching for DAC805xxEVM in the Windows® Start menu.

Figure 3-3 shows the Device Setting configuration menu that is present when the GUI is launched. Select the DAC80516 device from the drop down menu and click *CONFIG*.




Figure 3-4. DAC8050xxEVM Interface Settings Menu

After a device is selected, the Interface Settings menu pops up. This menu is shown in Figure 3-4. From this menu, select the interface protocol, as well as the I²C address and I²C speed if I²C has been selected as the protocal. Select the *CONFIG* button to save the current settings and launch the main GUI.




Figure 3-5. DAC805xxEVM GUI DAC80516 Selection at Launch

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Figure 3-5 shows the GUI after launch with the DAC80516 register map loaded.

If the FT4232 controller is not connected to the computer when the software is launched, then the GUI defaults to demo mode. Figure 3-6 illustrates the bottom-left corner of the GUI that shows the hardware connection status: DEMO MODE or CONNECTED. After the FT4232 controller is properly connected to the computer, click the Demo Mode box in the upper right to initialize the EVM.

3.3 Software Features

The DAC805xxEVM GUI allows for I²C or SPI communication to the DAC80516. Although the entire register map is available for use, some features have been abstracted into user controls in the High-Level Configuration page for easy operation.

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3.3.1 Low Level Configuration Page




Figure 3-7. DAC80516 Low Level Configuration Page

Figure 3-7 shows the *Low Level Configuration* page of the DAC805xxEVM GUI. This page allows direct access to all registers on the DAC80516.

The *Register Map* section in the center of the page lists all the registers. Directly above the *Register Map* section are four buttons that allow for read and write access to all registers.

Select a register on the Register Map list to show a description of the values in that register, as well as information on the register address, default value, size, and current value. Data are written to the registers by entering a value in the value column of the GUI.

3.3.2 High Level Configuration Page

The *High Level Configuration* page is used to set the configuration of the DAC805xxEVM GUI. The page is comprised of two tabs: *DAC80516 - DACs* and *DAC805016 - CLEAR/GPIO*. These two tabs act as shortcuts to configure the DAC80516 for basic functionality and testing.

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


Figure 3-8. DAC80516 DACs Tab of the High Level Configuration Page

Figure 3-8 shows the *DAC80516 - DACs* tab of the *High Level Configuration* page. This tab is used to set the gain and output of the DACs. The internal reference can also be powered on and off here.




Figure 3-9. DAC80516 CLEAR/GPIO Tab of the High Level Configuration Page




Figure 4-1. DAC80516EVM Schematic: DAC80516 Interface




Figure 4-2. DAC80516EVM Schematic: FTDI Controller Interface




Figure 4-3. DAC80516EVM PCB Top Layer Layout




Figure 4-4. DAC80516EVM PCB Ground Plane Layout






Figure 4-5. DAC80516EVM PCB Power Plane Layout




Figure 4-6. DAC80516EVM PCB Bottom Layer Layout
